

### Poor Governance (in terms of Monitoring, Control and Surveillance)



- 904 fisheries surveillance officers (Ministry of Marine Affairs and Fisheries)
- 47 fisheries civil investigators (Ministry of Marine Affairs and Fisheries)
- 124 patrol boats (Ministry of Marine Affairs and Fisheries)



- 14 patrol boats (Coast Guard)
- ±150 patrol boats (Navy)



Inadequacy of advanced technology to monitor activities of vessels



Absence of comprehensive compliance monitoring mechanism (compliance and deterrence approach)



142 surveillance geographical points of the Ministry of Marine Affairs and Fisheries across Indonesia (consists of large, middle and small sized posts)




- Administrative sanctions: revocation of 15 business licenses, 291 fishing licenses, suspension of 61 licenses and issuance of 48 administrative warning





# **MULTI-DOOR APPROACH**

- Why Legal Multi Disciplinary approach for IUU Fishing enforcement?
- Crimes in marine and fishery sector is a cross-sector crime;
- Statutory limitation makes it necessary to use other regulation to capture IUU Fishing perpetrators;
- Fisheries crime usually involves money laundering, bribery and gratification, and tax evasion /fraudulence;
- Application of "follow the suspect and follow the asset" principle
- Punishment of the functional perpetrators in addition to the physical perpetrators







# **PUSAKA BENJINA CASE**



#### **Violations**

- Human trafficking and modern slavery
- Child labour
- Smuggling of people and goods
- Illegal transhipment
- Use of prohibited fishing gears (trawl)
- Forgery of vessels and seafarers documents
- Illegal transaction of fuel

### **Status and Legal Process**

- 682 seafarers in Benjina became victims of trafficking
- 8 (eight) people in Benjina are in the process of prosecution (incl. companies' managers) – now the accused
- 5 (five) vessels carrying victims of trafficking have been confiscated
- Investigation is conducted for fish crimes, forgery, labour crime, immigration crime, and money laundering by the Police and MMAF investigators.

### **Transnational Elements in Benjina Case**

- Victims of trafficking and slavery originated from various countries, e.g. Thailand, Myanmar, Lao, Cambodia, and Vietnam
- One of the owners is a company registered in British Virgin Islands that is affiliated with a Hong Kong company owned by two Thai citizens
- Most fishing vessels were built in Thailand and using at least Indonesian, Thai, and PNG flags
- Caught fishes from Indonesia and transhiped the fish in the PNG waters with a Thai reefer.











































# **Modern slavery**

An Associated Press investigation into the Thai fishing industry uncovered conditions of modern-day slavery feeding the supply chains of major U.S. stores and led to the rescue of hundreds of men.







# **MV VIKING CASE**



### **Violations**

- In the last 10 years, Viking has operated by using 12 different vessel names and flew at least flags of 8 different states;
- On 3 incidents since 2012, Viking has given false registration documents to port authorities during site inspections;
- On March 15<sup>th</sup> 2015, Viking was detained in Malaysia by Malaysia's authorities in which the captain is found guilty under Malaysia's Fisheries Law and sentenced to pay RM 200,000

### **Status and Legal Process**

- Viking (1.322GT) entered Indonesian waters without any prior notice and with Automatic Identification System (AIS) being switched off;
- Viking was also equipped with fishing gears, which lead to suspicions that Viking has been illegally fishing in Indonesian waters;
- Viking got arrested by Indonesian Navy on February 26<sup>th</sup> 2016 within Indonesia's Exclusive Economics Zone (EEZ), 12.7 Miles from Bintan, Riau Archipelago.
- Viking was drowned on March 14<sup>th</sup> 2016 in Pangandaraan, West Java, Indonesia

### Transnational Elements in FV. Viking Case

- Viking is owned by Spanish and Panama companies, operated by an agent in South East Asia which domiciled in several countries; [FV. Viking have been fined for 5.3 million Euro by the Spanish Supreme Court]
- The Captain is of Chile national;
- Crewing, logistics, and financed through operators in Singapore;
- Fishing in various waters around the world and exported to Hong Kong, Malaysia, Vietnam, and Taiwan through an investment company in South Africa.



# WAYS FORWARD TO COMBAT FISHERIES CRIME



1) Fisheries Crime modus Assessment (Identifying the Types of Fisheries and Fisheries-Related Crime)



2) Interagency collaboration and coordination



3) Facilitate the use of INTERPOL Notices



4) Intelligence data analysis - Human and Signal Intelligence incl. Open Source Information (OSI)



6) Capacity building for enforcement officers.



7) International support for enforcement operation (Multilateral Investigative Support Team)

# INTERNATIONAL COOPERATION

#### **RI-USA**

- Provide training on Intelligence Led Enforcement Operation (ILEO)
- Provide technological assistance for intelligence information analysis
- Global Fishing Watch (GFW)

#### SATGAS 115-IOM

- Identification, Evacuation, Remediation and Repatriation of 1500 victims of human trafficking (VoTs) in Ambon and Benjina.
- Identification of VoTs onboard Hua Li 8, FV Viking, 3 illegal Malaysian vessels ati Pontianak and Philippines vessels at Ambon

#### **SATGAS 115-INTERPOL**

- Intelligence information and analysis to apprehend FV Viking.
- Indonesia-INTERPOL, and Spain are now cooperating in criminal proceedings against vessel owner in Spain. This effort is assisted by Canada, South Africa and Norway.

# INTERNATIONAL FISHFORCE ACADEMY OF INDONESIA (IFFAI)






#### **Establishment of IFFAI**

- On 3 December 2016, MMAF, Task Force 115 and Police of the Republic of Indonesia have signed an MoU which marked the establishment of Intl FishFORCE Academy of Indonesia (IFFAI)
- IFFAI is established under INTERPOL FCWG as an initiative to strengthen the ability of law enforcement officers to detect, to response and to punish fisheries crime and fisheries related crimes.
- The first IFFAI training was held on Mar 16-25,
   2017 and trained investigators from National
   Police, Navy, and MMAF as well as prosecutors.


### **Objectives of IFFAI**

- Seek colaboration with international partners to effectively combat fisheries crime and fisheries related crimes


# Any Contribution to the National Economy and Small-scale Fishermen?

Growth of fisheries sector has consistently been higher compared to the growth of national GDP from year 2013 until 2016




National fish stock has consistently increased from 7.3 million tonnes (in 2013) to 12.5 million tonnes (in 2017)

#### 10 Net Seafood Exporter Globally (USD)



### Indonesia's Seafood Trade Balance becomes No. 1 in ASEAN


#### Balance in Value, Seafood Products in ASEAN 2001-2016 (US\$ Thousand)
